For a Catholic to be a sponsor for the Sacraments of Baptism or Confirmation, one must be a practicing Catholic regularly attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Sacraments, a registered member of the Parish receiving contribution envelopes to support the Parish for a minimum of four months.

Young adults of parishioners who have earlier been under their parent's registration and who are now on their own and remain in the Parish must register as an adult parishioner and receive envelopes. All requests for a certificate should be made four weeks in advance of the designated date needed for sponsorship.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick & Holy Communion are available upon request to those who are sick, elderly or homebound. Families are requested to call the Parish Office to arrange a visit.

3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time "Through the Power of the Holy Spirit"

Jesus lived a quiet life for 30 years as a carpenter, the son of Joseph. During this time, he didn't do anything that would draw attention to himself. But everything changed after his baptism when he began to preach, perform miracles, and gather his apostles. This change happened "through the power of the Holy Spirit." Because of this, many people started to follow him.

After a few months of preaching, Jesus returned to his hometown of Nazareth. He went to the local synagogue and read from the prophet Isaiah, who spoke about how God's kingdom is near and how he brings good news to the poor. The Holy Spirit was the one who energized Jesus' mission. It was the Holy Spirit that helped Jesus leave his comfortable life in Nazareth and travel to different places to share his message.

Even before his baptism, the Holy Spirit was with Jesus. It became clear when the Spirit came down on him like a dove during his baptism. This sign showed a new beginning, bringing joy and peace, just like the dove that appeared after the flood in the story of Noah.

The same Holy Spirit that worked in Jesus was also active among the early Christians. In the Acts of the Apostles, we see how the Christian faith spread from Jerusalem to Rome. It didn't happen through a planned strategy; it grew slowly, especially after the persecution of Christians led to them moving to different places. Just when it seemed like Christianity might fade away after the martyrdom of Stephen, it actually began to grow in other parts of the Roman Empire.

For early Christians, genuine mission and the Holy Spirit went hand in hand. They often prayed, "Come, Holy Spirit, we need you." Christians receive the Holy Spirit during baptism and confirmation, but many forget to call on him. When they remember and ask for the Spirit's help, they allow him to work in their lives.

Pope Francis teaches that mission is essential to being a Christian. In his writing "The Joy of the Gospel," he describes a world filled with sad and troubled people. Many focus too much on their own worries and problems or get caught up in arguments about church practices. This can turn their involvement in the church into something negative instead of loving.

True joy comes back when we share the Good News with those in need. The poor show us the face of Jesus, who alone can bring us joy. This all happens through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Let us remember to invite the Holy Spirit into our lives, so we can share joy and hope with others.
